## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE -

### Strong API Scores in Year Two

Although CNEC is off to a strong start in year three, we need to take a moment to celebrate the academic accomplishments of the 2008-09 school year. The students and staff worked very hard during year two and the test results proved that hard work does pay off. For the second year in a row, Granite Ridge finished with the highest API in the district amongst the intermediate schools and Clovis North finished with the highest API in the district amongst the high schools. Granite Ridge grew 22 points to 899 while Clovis North grew 7 points to 866. These scores place both schools amongst the highest not only in the Central Valley but possibly amongst the

highest in the State as well. Congratulations to all of our students and staff on their hard work. A special "thank you" to all of our families who continue to stress the importance of studying and high academic standards with their students.

As we begin the 2009-10 school year our staff is working hard to ensure all students are working to their potential. The school motto of "**Unity, Courage, and Commitment**" are words that were chosen by our students and staff because we believe that these three action words best describe our daily efforts to be the best we can be in mind, body, and spirit.

### Failure is Not an Option: Year Two of "Mandatutorials"

CNEC is committed to provide students with every opportunity to be academically successful. Currently, Ms. Torres, Mr. Shannon, Mrs. Morandi, and Mr. Anderson are "hosting" mandatutorial sessions the first 20 minutes of lunch on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. These sessions are not optional and are attended by

students who have earned more than one F on the progress report/report card. According to the students, the number one reason they are not being successful is the failure to do homework and/or turning in classroom assignments. Students spend the 20 minutes working on homework and class work. By its' name one can tell this is not an optional program. The goal is for the students to earn passing grades in all classes the next reporting period and return to the extended lunch.

### **NAVIANCE FAMILY CONNECTION IS UP AND RUNNING!!!**

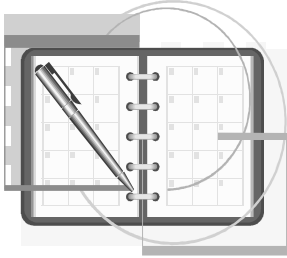
For those of you who are not yet aware, NAVIANCE is an on-line college and career planning website for students and parents. This program is sponsored by the Clovis North Bronco Foundation. At no cost to you, Family Connection will allow the students and parents to do the following:

- **College Exploration**
  - Search for colleges based on personal preferences (i.e., location, size, majors, athletics, cost, selectivity, etc.)
  - View multimedia college profiles
  - Track the college application process from start to finish
- **Career Assessments (Visit your child's account to see their results)**
  - 9<sup>TH</sup> Grade: Learning Styles – Students examined their good/poor study habits
  - 10<sup>th</sup> Grade: Personality Profile – Students examined their interests and related to career paths
  - 11<sup>th</sup> Grade: Career Interest Profile – Students explored more in-depth career pathways.

### COLLEGE REPRESENTATIVES VISITING CLOVIS NORTH

College visitations are an important part of your student's junior year experience. To provide Clovis North students opportunities to explore college options, we will conduct a series of lunch time college visitations throughout this year. Students will hear key elements, entrance requirements, and printed information from university representatives. As these visitations become available the counseling department will post announcements on our website, our daily bulletin, and through NAVIANCE emails. In addition, visitations, and upcoming dates can be heard during our daily 3rd period public announcements. At this time the following colleges have visited our campus:

Fresno College Visitation Night (Fresno Convention Center), Christian Colleges Visitation Night (North West Church), University of Arizona, Mills College, Texas Christian University  
University of Alaska, Cal Baptist University, Point Loma, Fresno Pacific University  
Yale University, and Military Academy Night (Clovis West High School)

We look forward to a Stanford visitation and an information night regarding admission to Columbia University and other Ivy League schools.

### Virtual College Visitations

In addition to our traditional campus visitations, there are also fantastic web based programs offered to students which allow students to not only discover colleges of interest but provide videos, live seminars, and real time Q and A sessions with staff and students representing these universities. The informational sessions can be found at [collegeweeklive.com](http://collegeweeklive.com). In addition to this web based program, Naviance Family Connection is now available to all high school students and parents to explore a variety of information about college admission requirements, costs, and course offerings. Ultimately, we encourage students to explore and personally visit as many colleges as possible.

### UNITRACK

Clovis North High School is participating in the Unitrack Program. Unitrack is a program initiated by California State University, Fresno through which high school students can enjoy concurrent Fresno State student status and earn college credit by taking and successfully completing selected high school courses. This year, any high school junior who is enrolled in one or more of the following classes: AP Biology, AP US History, AP Calculus AB, or AP Calculus BC, may participate. This fall Unitrack registration fee was \$40 per course. In order to earn Unitrack credits, students must receive a grade of "C" or higher for the course. If the grade is below a "C," students will receive a "W" on their CSU Fresno transcript. When students apply to college, they can request a transcript from CSU Fresno indicating that they took the Clovis North High School class as a CSU Fresno equivalent. Acceptance of Unitrack Credits varies from campus to campus.

## JUNIOR CONFERENCES

Conferences for Juniors began mid-October. Counselors will check student's progress towards graduation, future goals, and post-secondary plans. The Junior year is an important time to reflect on those goals and begin to make some decisions. Students planning to attend a 4-year college / university should get started on their Senior Portfolio.



## STUDENT SERVICES -

The Student Services Office is here to support students with their academic endeavors by providing guidance with behavioral/discipline and attendance issues. Included in that role are dress code, detentions, Student Attendance and Review Boards (SARBs), Saturday/Thursday school, Behavior Support Plans, and behavioral support program referrals including Peer Counseling, SAP Counseling, Peer Mediation, and Psychological Services.

The Student Services office is pleased to welcome its newest team member, Student Relations Liaison (SRL) Shari Tolbert to the Student Services team. Sheri comes to us after earning her Master's Degree in counseling and completing her internship last year in the CNEC Counseling Center.

The Student Services Office also wants to remind students and their families that gum and iPods are prohibited items on campus at all times. Also, CUSD dress code will be strictly enforced on campus and at all co-curricular events. Effective November 1<sup>st</sup>, students may not wear shorts on campus.

## STUDENT SAFETY -

School Safety is taken very seriously at CNEC. A safe school plan has been developed that continually reviews policies and procedures as needed. The plan encompasses all emergency situations, the physical environment of the school and the climate of the school. At CNEC we start by making sure the school campus is a safe and caring place. Effective and safe schools communicate a strong sense of security. There are many ways we help assure a safe environment:

- Supervising access to the building and grounds
- Supervision before and after school as well as during lunch time
- Practicing emergency drills such as fire drills, lock down drills, and school evacuation drills
- Adjusting scheduling to minimize time in the hallways or in potentially dangerous locations. Traffic flow patterns can be modified to limit potential for conflicts or altercations.
- Conducting a building safety audit in consultation with school security personnel and/or law enforcement experts. Effective schools adhere to federal, state, and local nondiscrimination and public safety laws, and use guidelines set by the state department of education.
- Closing school campuses during lunch periods.
- Arranging supervision at critical times (for example, in hallways between classes) and having a plan to deploy supervisory staff to areas where incidents are likely to occur.
- Prohibiting students from congregating in areas where they are likely to engage in rule-breaking or intimidating and aggressive behaviors.
- Having adults visibly present throughout the school building. This includes encouraging parents to visit the school.
- Monitoring the surrounding school grounds-including landscaping, parking lots, and bus stops.
- Coordinating with local police to ensure that there are safe routes to and from school.
- Implementing Character COUNTS!
- Implementing Zero Tolerance

In addition to targeting areas for increased safety measures, CNEC has identified safe areas where staff and students should go in the event of a crisis. Our off campus locations are Clovis Hills Community Church and the State Center Community College adjacent to CNEC. The safety of the students and staff at CNEC are always considered when making decisions regarding our safe school plan and our supervision policies. *Ruth DiSanto, Deputy Principal*

## NOTES FROM THE NURSE -

### Simple steps can protect everyone during flu season

The new H1N1 flu is still circulating in our community, and will soon be joined by the regular cold and flu season. To help keep all of our CUSD students and families healthy, please keep the following healthy habits in mind:

- Just like we do at school, encourage your child to frequently wash his or her hands, cover coughs and sneezes, and avoid sharing food or drinks with others.
- Don't send your child to school if he or she is running a fever of 100 degrees or higher, and has one or more of the following symptoms: a cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, vomiting or diarrhea, or extreme fatigue.
- Before sending your child back to school after an illness, make sure he or she is fever-free (without the use of a fever reducer, like Tylenol) for 24 hours.

Students who arrive at school with flu symptoms will be sent home to recover, and to avoid spreading the flu among classmates. Clovis Unified will continue to conduct daily sanitation of bathrooms and high contact areas such as door knobs and countertops, but the best protection against colds and flu are the simple steps listed above. 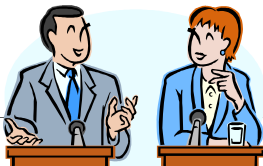
### FORENSICS And DEBATE

## ADVANCED PLACEMENT - US HISTORY -

Students in Mrs. Linder's AP US History classes are experiencing the rigor of a college class while still in high school, and are doing a fine job thus far! Students who registered for the Uni-track program at Fresno State University will be eligible to earn college credits by maintaining at least a "C" average in the class throughout the year, leading up to the AP Test in early May. In AP US, students are expected to master course material by reading at a college level (both from textbook and required outside reading sources), learn to write AP quality essays (at least 13-15 prior to the AP test), work collaboratively, and perfect the Cornell style note-taking system. In addition, all students are required to pass the "President's Test" by the end of the first semester—being able to name all 44 presidents, their terms of office, and political party affiliations without making a mistake. All students are encouraged to complete "extra work" assignments in addition to the regular curriculum to enhance their outside knowledge of the subject matter. ## AVID -

The CNEC AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) program continues to grow with the addition of a new freshman elective class, taught by Mrs. Marty Swift. Also new this year is our 7th /8th grade AVID elective teacher, Mr. Jerry Gordo. These two classes, along with the sophomore/junior AVID class, taught by AVID Coordinator, Mrs. Linda Linder, offers qualified students a rigorous college-prep curriculum designed to prepare them to enter and graduate from a four-year college.

Based on the core curriculum of WICR—Writing, Inquiry, Collaboration, and Reading—AVID students engage in a variety of educational strategies including weekly tutorial sessions and binder checks w/college and/or high school tutors, public speaking, a range of writing experiences (including the "college essay"), philosophical chairs and Socratic Seminar, team-building activities, and college field trips. Students are also required to complete at least two community service activities each semester. ## PSAT - PLAN TESTS -

On October 14, approximately 720 Granite Ridge and Clovis North students took the PSAT (preliminary SAT). The PSAT/NMSQT is the best preparation for the SAT Reasoning Test. Students in 11th grade who take the test and meet other program entry requirements may enter National Merit Scholarship Corporation programs. All students who take the PSAT/NMSQT will receive an official score report. They will receive scores in critical reading, mathematics, and writing skills and will see how their scores compare to those of other students across the country. Through a question-by-question review of answers, students will be able to see which answers were correct/incorrect. They will also receive a personalized statement of specific academic skills that need attention, along with suggested steps to improve those skills. Students who take the test will receive free access to My College QuickStart, an online college and career planning tool. Score reports will be given back to students in December or January. A brief meeting will be scheduled to explain what their results.

On October 15, approximately 420 Clovis North students took the PLAN. The PLAN is a great way for students to prepare for the ACT test. It covers English, Math, Reading, and Science, just like the ACT. The PLAN has a career interest inventory that help students find the best career choices for them. Like the PSAT, the PLAN also has a guide that explains what scores mean and how they can be used to help you better prepare for the ACT.
